The Minnesota Klezmer Band, Bulka's Song

A "klezmer" is not a musical style, but a person: an "instrument of song." What some call "klezmer" music is just a collection of styles one group of klezmers used to play. To identify that particular style as the only authentic "klezmer" music would be as constricting as to identify 1920s New Orleans style jazz as the only authentic

The Minnesota Klezmer Band is a klezmer band not because we play only one style of music, but because we are a band of klezmers. Like our forbears, we play not only Jewish-style instrumental wedding music, but other music. Like our forbears, we incorporate elements of the music around us into the new Jewish music we compose and perform. Like our forbears, we stay true to our roots, but our roots have penetrated to a lot of places.

Thus, every single member of the Minnesota Klezmer Band can play not only Eastern European wedding music, but other musics like jazz and classical as well. Versatility is a requirement of a true klezmer.

The new CD Bulka's Song reflects our approach. The tunes are both commonly identified as klezmer and also other Jewish music not commonly characterized as "klezmer." We also compose and perform new Jewish music that learns freely from Jewish traditions outside Eastern Europe and other traditions not Jewish at all. Some of the old songs we sing are in Yiddish, but the new songs are in English, the language most commonly spoken by contemporary Jews all over the world.

Perhaps most distinctively, we make our music the American way, or more precisely, the jazz way. In performance, our band is not a dictatorship based on one individual's conception, but a freewheeling and democratic conception. We want improvisation, interplay, conversation, and spontaneity. This approach is modern, yet consistent with traditional Jewish ways of praying and making music.

The Minnesota Klezmer Band includes

clarinetist and vocalist Jerry Gotler, drummer Phil Hey, violinist Yuri Merzhevsky, bass player Gary Raynor, and composer/ pianist Joe Vass. Their new CD is called Bulka's Song. They will appear again at the Dakota Bar and Grill on Sunday, June 7, at 8 p.m.

Four years in the making, the recording also features a collaboration with mandolinist Peter Ostroushko and a duet with percussionist Jimmy Higgins (from the Riverdance band.)
